#### Report on the Financial Statements

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Non-Secure Programs, Inc., which comprise the balance sheet as of December 31, 2017, and the related statements of income and retained earnings, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Nature of Business

The Company operates substance abuse treatment programs and probation and restitution programs under contracts with the Florida Department of Corrections. The Company operated facilities at Pensacola, Panama City, Ocala, Tallahassee, and Orlando, Florida in 2017; however, the Orlando program was transferred to Pensacola at the end of July 2017.

#### Property and Equipment

The Company's property and equipment are recorded at cost and are depreciated by straight-line and accelerated methods over useful lives of 3 to 15 years.

#### **Income Taxes**

The Company, with the consent of its shareholder, has elected under the Internal Revenue Code to be an S corporation. In lieu of the corporation paying income taxes, the shareholders of an S corporation are taxed on their proportionate share of the Company's taxable income. Therefore, no provision or liability for income taxes has been included in these financial statements.

#### Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### NOTE 2 - ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable consist of amounts due on billings for services provided under Florida state contracts. Management considers all outstanding amounts collectible.

#### NOTE 3 - LOANS TO AND FROM AFFILIATES

The Company has an outstanding loan to its affiliate, Keeton Corrections, Inc., in the amount of \$243,770, and an outstanding loan from its affiliate, Spence Holdings, Inc., for \$68,256. The loans are unsecured, non-interest bearing, and are due on demand.

#### NOTE 4 - NOTE PAYABLE - BANK

The Company has a line of credit loan with a local bank. The balance of the loan at December 31, 2017, was \$100,000 and bears interest at 4.75% per annum. The loan is unsecured and matures in July 2018.

#### NOTE 5 - RENT PAYABLE - AFFILIATE

The Company, at December 31, 2017, had recorded a liability to its affiliate, Spence Holdings., Inc., for unpaid rent of \$24,655.

#### NOTE 6 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Company shares common management, home office facilities and administrative costs with Keeton Corrections, Inc. and Spence Holdings, Inc. The sole stockholder of Non-Secure Programs, Inc. is also the sole stockholder of Keeton Corrections, Inc., and, with spouse, jointly owns Spence Holdings. Inc.

Certain shared expenses are paid by each company, based on its share of actual use. See notes 3,5,7, and 8 for information on other related party transactions.

#### **NOTE 7 - LEASES**

The Company leases its housing facilities in Ocala and Orlando from unrelated parties under annual renewal or monthly renewal leases. The annual rent for the facilities was \$368,385, plus property taxes paid of \$58,782, in 2017.

The Company leases its facilities in Panama City, Pensacola and Tallahassee from an affiliate, Spence Holdings, Inc. The leases are for a term of 15 years, with options for three five-year extensions, and, with options, they expire in 2033, 2036 and 2045. Rent under the leases was \$517,445, plus property taxes paid of \$23,540 in 2017.

The Company leases vehicles, copiers and laundry equipment under operating leases, with payments totaling \$64,887 in 2017. Management anticipates that when leases expire, they will be replaced with similar leases.

#### **NOTE 8-EMPLOYEE BENEFITS**

The Company participates, for the benefit of its eligible employees, in a section 401(k) savings plan sponsored by Keeton Corrections, Inc., an affiliate. Under the savings plan, the Company offers a partial match of gross earnings contributed to the plan by vested employees. The Company's contribution to the 401(k) plan for the plan year ended July 31, 2017, was \$1,753.

#### NOTE 9 - CONTRACTS

Florida state contracts are generally for a period of five years, and include optional annual extension periods for up to five years. Management anticipates that, as contracts expire, the Company will be awarded new contracts.

#### **NOTE 11 - LITIGATION**

The Company is occasionally involved in various legal actions which arise normally in the course of its business. Management does not anticipate that the outcome of any current or pending litigation will have a material effect on the Company's financial position.

I have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Non-Secure Programs, Inc. which comprise the balance sheet as of December 31, 2017, and the related statements of income and retained earnings, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued my report thereon dated September 20, 2018.

#### **Internal Control Over Financial Reporting**

In planning and performing my audit of the financial statements, I considered Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing my opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s internal control. #### Report on Compliance for Each Major State Program

I have audited Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the OMB Compliance Supplement, and the requirements described in the Department of Financial Services State Projects Compliance Supplement, that could have a direct and material effect on each of Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s major state programs for the year ended December 31, 2017. Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s major state programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

#### Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, and contracts applicable to its state programs.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance for each of Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s major state programs based on my audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. I conducted my audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements of Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance); and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the Auditor General. Those standards, and the Uniform Guidance and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the Auditor General, require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major state program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion on compliance for each major state program. However, my audit does not provide a legal determination of Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s compliance.

#### Opinion on Each Major State Program

In my opinion, Non-Secure Programs, Inc. complied, in all material respects, with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major state programs for the year ended December 31, 2017.

#### Report on Internal Control Over Compliance

Management of Non-Secure Programs, Inc. is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above. In planning and performing my audit of compliance, I considered Non-Secure Programs, Inc.'s internal control over compliance with the types of requirements that could have a direct and material effect on each major state program to determine the auditing procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance for each major state program and to test and report on the internal control over compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the Auditor General, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, I do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Non-Secure Program, Inc.'s internal control over compliance.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a state program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a state program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of state program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

My consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. I did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that I consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of the Uniform Guidance and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the Auditor General. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.

- 8. The threshold used for distinguishing between Type A and B programs is \$750,000, under Rule 69I-5.008 F.A.C. However, since all of the Company's programs are awarded by the same state agency and have similar compliance requirements, the threshold was applied to total expenditures of state awards, rather than to individual program expenditures. All programs were treated as Type A programs.

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#### MANAGEMENT LETTER

#### Report on financial statements

I have audited the financial statements of Non-Secure Programs, Inc. as of and for the year ended December 31, 2017, and have issued my report thereon dated September 20, 2018.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements of Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance); and Chapter 10.650 or Rules of the Auditor General.

#### Other Reports and Schedule

I have issued my Independent Auditor's Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of the Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with Governments Auditing Standards, Independent Auditor's Report on Compliance for Each Major State Project and Report on Internal Control over Compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the Florida Auditor General; and Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. Disclosures in those reports and schedule, which are dated September 20, 2018, should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.

#### Other Matter

Section 10.654(1)(e), Rules of the Auditor General, requires that I address noncompliance with provisions of contracts or grant agreements, or abuse, that have occurred, or are likely to have occurred, that have an effect on the financial statements or State project amounts that is less than material but which warrants the attention of those charged with governance. In connection with my audit, I did not have any such findings. I do, however, with to call your attention to the lack of segregation of duties in your company's accounting department. There is an inherent weakness in your system of internal control, due to the fact that most of your accounting functions at the home office are centered in one individual. Your comptroller initiates financial transactions, such as checks and deposits, makes journal entries, has access to your signature stamp, and reconciles the bank statements. I do not consider this condition to be a material weakness because you are aware of the situation and have established alternative procedures to compensate for the inherent weakness. You monitor the bank account closely and review bank reconciliations with bank statements each month. You read financial statements each month and make inquires regarding questionable items. You pay particular attention to transactions authorized by your signature stamp. You are familiar with your employees and vendors, etc. I realize that this condition exists of necessity, due to the small number of employees in your home office, and that the use of your signature stamp is necessitated by the volume of checks and the fact that you are often out of town or otherwise not immediately available. I mention this inherent weakness here simply to remind you that the lack of segregation of duties does exist; therefore, it is important that the alternative procedures continue to be implemented.
