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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors, John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of John G. Riley Foundation, Inc., which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of John G. Riley Foundation, Inc., as of December 31, 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of John G. Riley Foundation, Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued. Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit

conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design
 audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose
 of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s
 internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of State Financial Assistance as required by Chapter 10.650, Rules of the State of Florida, Office of the Auditor General, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the Schedule of State Financial Assistance is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 22, 2023, on our consideration of John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

The following is a summary of the more significant accounting policies and practices of John G. Riley Foundation, Inc. (the "Organization"):

- (a) Organization and Purpose John G. Riley Foundation, Inc. was incorporated on September 12, 1979, as a nonprofit organization located in Tallahassee, Florida. The purpose of the Foundation is to preserve African American History and provide programs and services to serve as a reminder of African American's rich heritage and legacies. The John G. Riley Foundation, Inc. is also the sole member of the Florida African American Heritage Preservation Network, LLC which was organized to provide regional coordination of the efforts to preserve and provide programs throughout Florida related to African American History.
- (b) **Property and Equipment** Property and equipment with a value greater than \$1,000 and an estimated useful life of at least one year is recorded at cost when purchased or at fair market value when contributed. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the 3 to 5 year estimated useful lives of the assets.
- (c) **Income Taxes** The Organization is generally exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements.
 - The Organization files income tax returns in the U.S. Federal jurisdiction. The Organization's income tax returns for the past three years are subject to examination by tax authorities and may change upon examination.
 - The Organization has reviewed and evaluated the relevant technical merits of each of its tax positions in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America for accounting for uncertainty in income taxes and determined that there are no uncertain tax positions that would have a material impact on the financial statements.
- (d) **Cash and Cash Equivalents** For the purpose of reporting cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and amounts in demand deposits held with banks, and short-term investments with an original maturity date of ninety days or less.
- (e) **Use of Estimates** The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

- (1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies: (Continued)
- (f) **Basis of Accounting** The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, and accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables, and other liabilities.
- (g) **Basis of Presentation** The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

Net assets without donor restrictions - Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor (or certain grantor) restrictions.

Net assets with donor restrictions - Net assets subject to donor-imposed stipulations. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

(h) **Contributions** - All contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor. Amounts received that are designated for future periods or restricted by the donor for specific purposes are reported as with donor restrictions. However, if a restriction is fulfilled in the same time period in which the contribution is received, the entity reports the support as without donor restrictions.

Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at the present value of their estimated future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using risk-free interest rates applicable to the years in which the promises are received. Amortization of the discounts is included in contribution revenue. Conditional promises to give are not included as support until the conditions are substantially met.

Contributed property and equipment is recorded at fair value at the date of donation. In the absence of donor-imposed stipulations regarding how long the contributed assets must be used, the entity has adopted a policy of not implying a time restriction on contributions of such assets.

- (1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies: (Continued)
- (i) **Functional Allocation of Expenses** The cost of providing the various services and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the program and supporting services benefited based on.
- (j) **Grant, Contract, and Other Receivables** Grant, contract, and other receivables are stated at the amount management expects to collect from balances outstanding at year-end. Based on management's assessment of the history with grantors and contractors having outstanding balances and current relationships with them, it has concluded that realization losses on balances outstanding at year-end will be immaterial.
- (k) **Revenue Recognition** The Organization receives all of its grant/contract revenue from state and local agencies. The Organization recognizes grant/contract revenue (up to the grant/contract ceiling) from its grants/contracts over a period which represents the service period for certain grants/contracts, or to the extent of expenses. Revenue recognition depends on the grant/contract.
- (l) Adoption of new accounting standard In May 2014, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update 2014-09: Revenue from Contracts with Customers, to clarify the principles used to recognize revenue for all entities. The new standard was implemented by the Organization during the year ended June 30, 2021. The Organization has evaluated the effect of implementation of the new standard noting no material effect to the financial statements.
- (m)Recently issued Accounting Pronouncements The Financial Accounting Standards Board (F ASB) issued new or modifications to, or interpretations of, existing accounting guidance during the year ended June 30, 2022. The Organization has considered the new pronouncements that altered accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and other than as disclosed in the notes to the financial statements below, does not believe that any other new or modified principles will have a material impact on the Organization's reported financial position or operations in the near term.

In February 2016, the FASB issued Accounting Standards Update 2016-02: Leases (Topic 842), to increase transparency and comparability among organizations by recognizing lease assets and lease liabilities on the statement of financial position and disclosing key information about leasing arrangements. The new standard is effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2021, and may be adopted early. The Organization is currently evaluating the effect that implementation of the new standard will have on its financial position, results of operations, and cash flows.

(2) <u>Significant Funding Source:</u>

The Organization receives 99% of its funding from the State of Florida, Department of State, Division of Arts and Culture. A significant reduction in the level of this funding, if this were to occur, could have an adverse effect on the Organization's programs and activities.

(3) Concentration of Credit Risk:

The more significant concentrations of credit risk are as follows:

- (a) Demand Deposits The Organization maintains cash deposits with three financial institution. The Organization has no policy requiring collateral to support its cash deposits, although all demand deposits with financial institutions are insured up to FDIC limits. At times such deposits may be in excess of FDIC limits.
- (b) Grant, Contract, and Other Receivables-The Organization's receivables are for amounts due under contracts with state and local agencies. The Organization has no policy requiring collateral or other security to support is receivables.

(4) Contingencies:

(a) Amounts received or receivable from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by grantor agencies, principally the State of Florida. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount, if any, of expenditures which may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time although the Organization expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

(5) Liquidity and Availability:

Financial assets available for general expenditure, that is, without donor restrictions or internal board designations limiting their use, within one year of the statement of financial position date, comprise the following:

(6) Beneficial Interest in Endowment:

During the year ended December 31, 2022, the Organization had a beneficial interest in an endowment held by The Community Foundation of North Florida, Inc. (the "Foundation") for the purpose of helping to further and carry out the purpose of the Organization. As of December 31, 2022, the fair value of the Organization's endowment fund excluding third party contributions was \$53,459. The Organization has the right to request a maximum of \$1,920 for its operational purposes.

Contractually, the Foundation retains legal ownership of principal amounts contributed. Therefore, the principal balances and any earnings or losses are excluded from the statement of financial position.

(7) Subsequent Events:

The Organization has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure in the financial statements through September 18, 2023, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

For the year ended December 31, 2022, \$940,000 was passed through to subrecipients.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the John G. Riley Foundation, Inc. (the "Organization") which comprise the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated September 22, 2023.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Organization's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies, and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified. However, as described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, we did identify certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control

that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Organization's financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control or on compliance. Report on Compliance for Major State Project

We have audited the John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s (the "Organization") compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the Department of Financial Services' State Projects Compliance Supplement that could have a direct and material effect on North Florida Office of Public Guardian, Inc.'s major State project for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2022. John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s major State project is identified in the summary of auditors' results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs.

Management's Responsibility

Management is responsible for compliance with State statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of its State projects applicable to its State projects.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on compliance for John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s major State project based on our audit of the types of compliance requirements referred to above. We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the State of Florida, Office of the Auditor General. Those standards and Chapter 10.650, Rules of the State of Florida, Office of the Auditor General, require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on the major State project occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about John G. Riley Foundation, Inc.'s compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion on compliance for the major State project.
